RUMBLE AT THE ROVAL

Just when I thought this hobby couldn't suck me in anymore, I made the mistake of tracking my GT on a NASCAR track during Rumble at the Roval 2022. Our friends Mike and Matt told us about this event as part of Team Shelby ECGN 2022 and I signed up, eager to see what a different location/track would bring to the experience. This event would be held at Charlotte Motor Speedway over two days and run the "Roval" layout, which was 2.28 miles in length. This included the infield portion and the back straight, along with a chicane in the front before the start/finish line.

In preparation for this event, I had to get my GT inspected by a qualified shop, who had to sign off on a multitude of criteria. As part of their evaluation and prep, they fitted my car with brand new Michelin Pilot Sport AS4 tires, a high-performance all-season tire which was the natural evolution from the prior AS3+ variant. As an added safety factor, brake fluid was flushed, and track pads were swapped in front and rear.

To break up the drive to Charlotte, we broke the trip out into two days and stayed at Mike's house in Virginia. No major incidents occurred on our way down, except for my track pads squeaking like crazy at stoplights due to their working temperature range. We checked in Friday night, got the car tech inspected, and proceeded to arrive at 7AM the next morning, ready to experience Charlotte with an open mind. For this event, I'd be running in the novice class with an instructor. We paired up before the first session and I was happy to see that my instructor was also a Mustang guy – owning a '11 GT500 convertible and a '99 Cobra track car.

This track was an entirely different experience than Pocono – the bank is 24 degrees, and the back straight allows serious speeds to be reached. Throughout the first day, I became more and more comfortable with the track layout

and received positive feedback from my instructor. For some reason, my traction control kept kicking in and cutting power when getting hard on the throttle, so we reduced the sensitivity on the second day with much improved success — the car was now allowing me to put the power down smoothly coming out of turns. While there was no one recording



speeds with a radar gun, I maxed out my 140MPH speedometer on the straight in each session. I was also lucky to have a couple of ride-a longs with my instructor in his track car, which allowed me to see the techniques of an established professional. He also showed me what my car was capable of in the hands of someone with actual skill, as my little GT gave faster cars and drivers a run for their money with him behind the wheel.

The caliber of cars that were at this even was really cool to see: everything from Camaros, Corvettes, real NASCAR cars, and even a Lamborghini track car that sounded like an explosion every time it started. Another common theme that we're seeing with these events is that everyone is so friendly and helpful. People are so open to lending tools and/or advice, even when you know they have loads of money in their truck/trailer/car setup easily. Events like these break down barriers and everyone's there for the same reason – to have fun and advance their driving skills.

This weekend was the most fun I've had in a long time and no major incidents occurred thankfully. I came away with several lessons: 1) you can never bring enough tools/gear, 2) always get track insurance, 3) always be 100% comfortable with the possibility of wrecking (we saw two wall collisions and two tire blowouts), 4) don't expect street tires to withstand 140+MPH and 24-degree banking without

some adverse wear, and 5) I'm going to need a trailer for future events in case of mechanical or other issues. You just never know what could happen in the world of high-performance driving events.

After about an hour or so of coffee and conversation, we saddled up for the brief ride to the Home.

After driving through the ornate gates, we were directed to a cordoned off area for us to park. Residents of the Home were invited to come out to visit with us and several, many with Mustang or car stories to share with GSRMC members.

We presented the Home with a check for \$1,250, which was very much appreciated. Afterwards, some



members stayed to visit the on-site museum of fire equipment, vehicles & gear.









IF A RINGBROTHERS CAR CAN BE DESCRIBED AS SUBTLE, THIS 1969 MUSTANG MACH I GETS THE NOD

s there no such thing as too much horsepower? Do show cars ever use the 1,000-plus horses under their hoods? Does the cubic-dollar math add up for anything but tenths in the quarter-mile and a few extra eyeballs at the shows? If, indeed, there's an upper rational limit on engine output before things start breaking and it takes just as much effort to put that power to the ground as it does to actually generate it, then maybe the most radical aspect to the Ringbrothers 1969 Ford Mustang Mach 1, PATRIARC, just revealed at this year's SEMA show might be its 580 horsepower engine.

Sure, 580 horsepower is a lot. Precisely double that of the M-code four-barrel 351 Windsor available

from the factory in the 1969 Mustang Mach 1 and more than even the factory rating of the more recent S550 Mustang Mach 1's 5.0L Coyote engine. On the other hand, at a venue like the SEMA show, where four-figure horsepower claims are standard these

days and excessiveness is the name of the game, that seems paltry, something akin to the default engine management setting that gets bypassed with a special red ignition key.

Paltry, maybe, but also refreshing. The whole Ringbrothers *modus operandi* these days is more like the customizer shops of days of yore, and with less attention



focused on the crate Aluminator 5.2 XS engine, it doesn't even have any fancy cam covers, just the stock ones from



Ford Performance. Ringbrothers devoted more time to radically reworking the Mustang itself.

For starters, the car's two inches longer—the Ringbrothers press release didn't say whether that's two inches in wheelbase or overall length —and two inches wider, with the rear quarters lowered on the body, the vents removed from the cowl, and a redesigned front

lower valance. The Roadster Shop Fast Track Stage III chassis, which includes Roadster Shop front and rear independent suspension and Penske Racing coilover shocks front and rear, has been welded to the body to create a full unibody, and the floorpan reshaped accordingly. Massive scoops incorporated into the leading edges of those quarter panels lead back to vents that flow through the custom individual

taillamps created to mimic the look of the original taillamps.

"The Mustang Mach 1 has always been an

aggressive-looking car, and we wanted to add to those classic good looks with subtle but critical changes," Ringbrothers co-owner Jim Ring says. "Over 5,000 hours went into perfecting the aesthetics."
